Lending Materials: All our library materials have a three week borrow period. Fines are 25 cents per item per day for overdue items. You can renew your items online, at the desk or via your online library account accessible at www.lacombelibrary.com.

Computer Usage: We have public computers with fast internet, the full Microsoft Office Suite, printing services and more.

Printing and Photocopying and more: We can assist you with printing and photocopying (colour and black and white; normal and legal size), faxing and scan-to-email services. Printing costs 25 cents/side of page for black and white; 50 cents/side for colour.

Exam Invigilation: Email mcmpl@prl.ab.ca to book your exams. \$40 for exams scheduled Monday through Friday, 10-5, \$50 for evening or Saturday exams.


Guest Contributor LMC Manager Pam: Secrets in the Cellar by John Glatt.
